international arbitrations. In addition, he has argued 18 cases before the Supreme Court, and briefed many others. He was also part of the team that successfully presented then-Governor Bush's position to the Supreme Court in *Bush v. Gore* (2000). From 1992 until 1997, Estrada served as Assistant to the Solicitor General of the United States. He previously served as Assistant U.S. Attorney and Deputy Chief of the Appellate Section, U.S. Attorney's Office, Southern District of New York. Estrada also served as a law clerk to the Honorable Anthony M. Kennedy in the U.S. Supreme Court from 1988-1989 and to the Honorable Amalya L. Kearsse in the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit from 1986-1987.

David Rudovsky is considered one of the nation's most renowned civil rights and criminal defense attorneys, having litigated major civil rights and police misconduct cases for over three decades. Rudovsky has been a Senior Fellow at the University of Pennsylvania Law School since 1987, teaching courses in Criminal Law, Constitutional Criminal Procedure, and Evidence. At the same time, he has continued his public interest law practice with the firm of Kairys, Rudovsky, Epstein & Messing. He has also written widely in the civil liberties/civil rights area, and has contributed both scholarly articles and litigation related books for practicing lawyers and judges. Rudovsky has received numerous awards, including a MacArthur Foundation Fellowship and Award for Accomplishments in Civil Rights Law and Criminal Justice, the ACLU Civil Liberties Award, and most recently the 2004 Harvey Levin Award for Excellence in Teaching.
