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NATIONAL CONSTITUTION CENTER QUARTERLY EVENTS CALENDAR JANUARY – MARCH 2017

Philadelphia, PA (January 5, 2017) – Upcoming highlights at the National Constitution Center include the Center's Winter Warm Up sale, a full day of Martin Luther King, Jr. Day of Service activities, the return of the critically acclaimed exhibit *American Spirits: The Rise and Fall of Prohibition*, and *America's Town Hall* programs featuring the timely constitutional conversations uniting thought leaders from all sides of the debate.

The National Constitution Center also announced its new pricing structure which began January 2, 2017. Youth tickets (ages 6-18) are \$11 and child tickets (age 5 & under) are free. Additional prices remain as follows: Adults \$14.50, Students w/ID and Seniors \$13, Active military personnel are free.

The National Constitution Center is located at 525 Arch Street on Philadelphia's Independence Mall. The Center is open 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Mondays through Saturdays and from noon to 5 p.m. on Sundays.

The National Constitution Center's <u>Winter Warm Up sale</u> will run now through March 31, 2017. For just \$10 for adults (usually \$14.50) and \$7.50 for youth ages 6-18 (usually \$11), visitors can experience the Center's main exhibit, take in the live production of *Freedom Rising* in the all-new Sidney Kimmel Theater, view a rare copy of the Bill of Rights and until January 20, explore the nature of executive power under the Constitution and how various presidents have exercised it over time in the *Powers of the President* exhibit. *This promotion is valid online only; tickets must be purchased in advance.*

Starting March 3, Winter Warm Up visitors will also be able add the feature exhibit *American Spirits: The Rise and Fall of Prohibition* to their visit for an additional \$3. *American Spirits: The Rise and Fall of Prohibition* take visitors back in time to the dawn of the temperance movement, through the Roaring '20s, and to the unprecedented repeal of a constitutional amendment.

The Museum of We the People is the first institution in Pennsylvania to exhibit this historic document to the general public. It has been preserved as part of The New York Public Library's renowned research collection for over 100 years. The Bill of Rights is displayed alongside a first edition Stone Engraving of the Declaration of Independence and a rare copy of the first public printing of the U.S. Constitution in the brand new George H.W. Bush Gallery.
