UNDERSTANDING THE MOSTSIGNIFICANT RULINGS OF THE 2013-2014 SUPREME COURT TERM AT THE NATIONAL CONSTITUTION CENTER

Philadelphia, PA (June 16, 2014) – Join the National Constitution Center and the <u>Anti-Defamation League</u> (ADL) for an in-depth review of the Supreme Court's 2013-2014 session with legal scholars **Erwin Chemerinsky** and **Frederick Lawrence** as well as **Deborah Lauter**, ADL's Civil Rights Director. The trio will discuss the significant rulings of the term including legislative prayer, the contraceptive mandate of the Affordable Care Act, affirmative action, and campaign finance, exploring how the outcomes of these decisions will directly impact the lives of Americans. The program also will touch on the legacy of one of the most significant Supreme Court rulings of the last century, *Brown vs. Board of Education*, on the occasion of its 60th anniversary.

One of the most popular programs of the Constitution Center's Town Hall series every year, the 2013-14 Supreme Court Review will take place on **Tuesday, July 8, 2014 at 12 p.m.** Admission is \$10 for members and non-members, \$30 with CLE credit, and free for 1787 Society. <u>Erwin Chemerinsky</u> is the founding dean and distinguished professor of law and Raymond Pryke Professor of First Amendment Law at the University of California, Irvine School of Law, with a joint appointment in Political Science. His areas of expertise include constitutional law, federal practice, civil rights and civil liberties, and appellate litigation. He is the author of eight books, including this fall's forthcoming *The Case Against the Supreme Court*, and nearly 200 articles in top law reviews. He frequently argues cases before the nation's highest courts and also serves as a commentator on -MORE-

legal issues for national and local media. Chemerinsky holds a law degree from Harvard Law School and a bachelor's degree from Northwestern University.

Frederick Lawrence is the president of Brandeis University. An accomplished scholar, teacher, and attorney, Lawrence is one of the nation's leading experts on civil rights, free expression, and bias crime. Prior to Brandeis, Lawrence was Dean and Robert Kramer Research Professor of Law at George Washington University Law School from 2005-10. With over 30 years in law, Lawrence has written, lectured, and testified widely on civil rights and hate crimes and is the author of *Punishing Hate: Bias Crimes Under American Law* (1999), which examines bias-motivated violence and how such crimes are dealt with in the United States. Lawrence, a native of Long Island, N.Y., received a bachelor's degree in 1977 from Williams College and a law degree in 1980 from Yale Law School.

Deborah Lauter is the director of Civil Rights of the Anti-Defamation League. She has been with the ADL for 15 years, having previously served as its regional director in Atlanta. She oversees domestic policy, programs, and staff for the ADL Legal Affairs Department, the Center on Extremism, the Research Center, and the Library and Archives. Lauter received a B.A. from the University of California, Berkeley, and a J.D. from Cardozo School of Law. Prior to joining the staff of ADL, she practiced corporate law in San Francisco, and served as the Community Relations Director for the Jewish Federation of Greater Atlanta.
