## MATTERS FOR DISCUSSION FIRST AMENDMENT: SPEECH

- Can a public school require students to recite the Pledge of Allegiance? (West Virginia Board of Education v. Barnette, 319 U.S. 624 (1943))
- Can a public school prevent students from wearing black armbands at school to protest a war? (Tinker v. Des Moines Independent Community School District, 393 U.S. 503 (1969))
- Can a public school prevent students from wearing shirts displaying the Confederate flag? (Melton v. Young, 465 F.2d 1332 (6<sup>th</sup> Cir. 1972))
- Can a public school prohibit students from wearing "I ♥ Boobies" armbands as part of a fundraiser for breast cancer research? (B.H. & K.M. v. Easton Area School District, 725 F.3d 293 (3d Cir. 2013); Bethel School District v. Fraser, 478 U.S. 675 (1986))
- Can a public school punish students for displaying a banner promoting drug use at a schoolsponsored event? (Morse v. Frederick, 551 U.S. 393 (2007))
- Can a public school punish students for criticizing the school principal on social media outside of school hours? (My Space case).
- Can the government punish Community Party members for advocating the overthrow of the United States government? (Whitney v. California, 274 U.S. 357 (1927))
- Can the government punish members of a hate group like the Ku Klux Klan for advocating violence against Jews and African-Americans at a rally? (*Brandenburg v. Ohio*, 395 U.S. 444 (1969))
- Can the government prevent a hate group like the Ku Klux Klan or neo-Nazis from marching through a predominantly Jewish town? (National Socialist Party of America v. Village of Skokie, 432 U.S. 43 (1977))
- Can the government punish someone for burning a cross on an African-American family's lawn? (Virginia v. Black, 538 U.S. 343 (2003))
- Can the government impose stricter punishments on violent criminals if it determines they committed a "hate crime" motivated by hatred against certain groups? (Loosely R.A.V. v. City of St. Paul, 505 U.S. 377 (1992))
- Can the government punish someone for wearing a shirt with an obscenity on it in a courtroom? (Cohen v. California, 403 U.S. 15 (1971))
- Can the government prevent people from protesting at a military funeral with signs displaying offensive messages toward the person who died? (*Snyder v. Phelps, 562 U.S. 443 (2011)*)
- Can the government punish someone for sending death threats to a public figure online? How about the President? (Watts v. United States, 394 U.S. 705 (1969) (in part))
